Moderator's Message

Relationships and Ch Gathering Together

Churches **Re-Gathering**

No churches two in the EMC experienced

the pandemic in the same way. What made the difference between our experiences? Many things, including the size of the church, the cultural background of attendees, the politics of the neighbourhood around the church, whether the church was urban or rural, the amount of COVID-19 in the area, the province the church was in, the personalities and approaches of the leaders, and sometimes even plain old luck. But as a whole, EMC churches have done better in the last two years than we feared we would. Let us thank God for his abundant care for us even when we got tired, exasperated, sick or discouraged. We are still standing and the gates of hell have not prevailed.



With the event postponed yet again, the National Youth Committee has encouraged youth groups to hold their own pre-launch events. We anticipate running a few regional youth events across the country at the end of May to indicate the priority we continue to place on students in our churches.



In 2021 the EMC zoom account hosted 80 or so online meetings with ministers, delegates, board members, prayer meeting participants and various task groups (and of course staff). in equal-sized blocks, regardless of their role or their distance from the host.

Missionaries joined prayer meetings with supporters, and ministers and delegates could participate from across the country without the expense and time-commitment of travel.

Women in Pastoral Ministry

Like the evangelical church across the world, the EMC is seeking the Lord's wisdom on the question of women in pastoral ministry. Ending June 2021 the Ministerial spent 15 months studying the question, asking what views or practices should be permitted within EMC doctrine and ministry practice. Led by

the Board of Leadership and Outreach they worked to craft a resolution to this ongoing dilemma that we thought might work. However, in a vote, that proposal narrowly failed to get the support it needed. We keep on praying, studying the Bible and asking the Lord to bring us to unity on this question.



Inspiring Partnership in Ministry

In 2018 the General Board formed the Inspiring Partnership In Ministry taskforce to help our Conference learn more about how men and women could work together in healthy and various ways. The group's mandate ended in 2021. They have asked us good questions: What fears do we have about men and women serving together? What stories need to be told, especially about women who have served their decades in our mission work and church ministry? Their work is ended, but may the Spirit continue to bring men and women together in powerful service in our churches.

Hermeneutics

As the Church across North America struggles mightily with enemies within and without, we need to be able to confidently answer the question; what does it mean to read the Bible like an EMCer? What convictions, practices and postures does an evangelical, Mennonite, Christian church bring to the table when we gather around the Word of God? The Education Committee of the Board of Church Ministries is considering a smallgroup Bible study resource to help us find our place on this question. Stay tuned.



Theodidaktos, after a break in 2021, will continuing without its founding editor. Thank you, Darryl Klassen for sixteen years generating dialogue on theology in EMC. In 2022 Kevin Wiebe together with Jesse Penner will build on Theo's tradition and branch into a new-to-us format. Look for their podcast—*The Armchair Anabaptist*, coming in January 2023.



People Carrying the Good News Near and Far

A Vision Trip to Spain

In 2021, the initiative to pursue Spain field as an EMC received substantial encouragement with the application of Antonio and Esther Pitta as long-term missionaries to Moroccans in Algeciras,



Spain. The Director of Global Outreach, Rolf Kruse, and Muslim ministry committee explored Muslim ministry options, continued the conversation with OM about partnership and an exploratory visit was planned for the fall.



In October, Antonio, Esther and Rolf travelled to Algeciras, Spain and met with ministry teams there. The initial plans for a partnership with OM in Spain have been reshaped and will continue to be refined. Meanwhile the Pittas have pursued different solutions for obtaining a visa to live in Spain.

Official partnership with OM and EMC is on hold for the time being. We continue to provide Antonio and Esther with the support we can to facilitate their move to Spain. We have also pursued conversations with other mission agencies to glean insight on how best to proceed.

Indigenous Ministry

The Indigenous Ministry Committee was formed two years ago in response to a Conference Council decision. Elvira Cote, Joshua Dueck, Peter Fehr, and Jen Kornelsen, along with Ken Zacharias and Gerald Reimer as staff members seek to identify the key issues affecting relationships between Indigenous people and European settlers. They have spent much time listening to one another's personal stories, sharing resources, and praying for a path forward. Each of them have also written or been interviewed for EMC publications and shared stories that build bridges and challenge us to think about our perspectives. We look forward to stronger and healthier relationships as we continue in partnership.

Updates on EMC Mission Fields

Bolivia

The Villa Nueva School, where Nancy Friesen works, successfully finished another school year with six graduates. Two Grade 12 students were killed in a motorcycle accident in August which was a very hard time for the whole school. The Teens group Nancy is involved in (Junior Youth) grew from 12 to 18 youth.

As noted on the next page, Benny Fehr passed away in June. Ester continues to serve in the radio ministry in San Jose.

Guadalajara, Mexico

The Mexico team began the year by focusing on leadership training with Juan and Ana and Hugo and Ivonne. They studied the book "The Emotionally Healthy Leader" and followed this up with a Leadership Retreat in May. The church met online for Sunday services until August when they began meeting in person, Bible studies, counselling, discipleship and service projects also continued.

Paraguay

In 2021 Chris and Revita Kroeker ministered to about 20 couples and 14 individuals with counselling and the marriage course. In the Minga church, they were able to hold services with only a few interruptions and are grateful for the three youth baptized in December, and the dozens of kids who come for Sunday school.

Travis and Rosey Zacharias' main ministry continues to be the church plant in Guavira Poty, Minga Guazu. Weekly church services, Sunday school, Bible studies, youth ministry and visitation continue as they lead the church plant and disciple believers. Their involvement with the Che Roga camp in Campo 9 has been good for them and for the children, adolescents and teens in their church.

A New EMC Mission Field?

The Board of Missions is recommending to Conference Council that Spain be approved as a new EMC missions Administered Field Antonio and Esther have already begun the visa application process and hope to make the move to Spain as soon as their visa is in place.

Obedience Following Jesus and His Call

New Church Plants

On a beautiful autumn evening in 2020, the Kingdom Life Church (KLC) members gathered at St. Vital EMC, with whom they had established a formal partnership. This marked the official opening of the KLC as part of the EMC, under the pastoral care of Ibrahim and Phebe Zabaneh.



This ministry seems to be extraordinary, not only in its focus on Arabic-speaking people in Winnipeg, but that it is led by a pastor couple with such incredible experience in this type of ministry. Many who attend this church arrived in Canada from a troubled past, often fleeing violence and therefore longing for hope in the midst of fear. KLC is providing this hope in the person of Jesus Christ.



Three weeks later in the small town of Bow Island, Alberta ,another community of faith met for the first time. Blessed by the commissioning and sending of families from the Gospel Light Church, some 45-minutes away, Bow Island EMC has a strong leadership core and many families in the community are hungry for a place to

worship the Lord together. Abe and Anna Bueckert agreed to use their first two years of retirement to mentor and support the new church, while Abe and Kara Penner, pastors of the Gospel Light Church, are revisioning how their church can not only rebound from this, but reset their path of outreach within the very needy town of Redcliff.

Obedient Unto Death

There are times when events in life don't seem to make any sense. Benny Fehr's untimely passing is one of those times. This strong and vibrant man passed away in June 2021 from



COVID at the age of 43. Benny and Ester had calculated the risk of serving overseas and decided to leave the comfort and security of their home in Canada to serve in radio ministry and be a witness in a spiritually dark context in Bolivia. We mourn the loss of Benny and pray for Ester and her children as they navigate life without him.

Church Plants Without Leaders

Several EMC church plants and ministries, (Winnipeg Logos, the Pelly outreach on the Cote reserve, and The ConneXion) sadly lost their pastor-leaders in 2021. A church plant without a pastor hinders the ministry in multiple ways and we desire

to see these churches be led once again by humble servants of the Lord. In the meantime they are being led by strong lay leaders.



Obedience to God's Call

The national staff remains committed to praying Luke 10:2; asking the Lord of the harvest to send workers. We are looking to God for pastors, church planters and missionaries from EMC churches, especially to fill the gaps in EMC Administered fields. Our goal is to have three couples or single people for each of the four fields of service. Would you pray along with us? Do you know of someone that should be challenged to respond to the call of God in their life? Perhaps that someone is you!

Rudiments is seven months of training, study, mentoring and examination that ministers who have been commissioned by their churches go through which credentials them by the EMC and prepares them for ordination. The Board of Leadership runs this cohort once each year. In 2021 ten pastors and missionaries completed the examination process.

Preparation for Spiritual Renewal



With much encouragement from pastors we decided to take away the brackets and devote Advent 2021 to Pentecost 2022 to asking God to awaken in us a new love for our Lord Jesus, send us the power to live like he does, and send us to the world with new vigour. We developed a set of common scriptures to study and preach from. We created a devotional journal that people could use as they walked alongside Jesus. We invited churches to consider what renewal would look like for them specifically. We invited churches to proclaim a fast leading up to Easter. We developed web-based resources. But all of this is simply a way of opening our clenched fists to receive again a work of God through his Spirit. May God set our churches on fire with the fierce but so gentle love of Jesus! May his grace and love soften our hearts to become fertile soil for his Word. May we humble ourselves before the majesty of Christ and offer our souls to him, regardless of the cost.

Renewal like this has so many facets; a heart warmed by the Spirit; a mind fired with the knowledge of the truth of the gospel; a will steeled to do what we are called to do; hands willing and able to care for the poor. It involves a renewal of our

Financial Report Sowing and Reaping

EMC has a strong agrarian base, so we are well acquainted with the concept of sowing and reaping. If you want a bountiful harvest, you can't skimp on the quality and quantity of the seed and fertilizer. It's the same way in God's kingdom. The church grows as we invest our time, energy, gifts and finances. EMCers have sowed generously throughout the years, and the church is indeed growing as a result of this investment.


The General Board requested a reduction in spending for 2021, given the uncertain nature of giving during the pandemic. The expenses last year reflect these reduced expenditures. However, the overall revenues for the year remained strong despite the financial challenges that people were facing, and so EMC ended the year with about \$330,000 more in revenue than in expenses.

The chart to the right shows 2021 expenditures for each of the boards, including both the undesignated (general) and designated funds.


The pie chart below shows the source of all undesignated revenue for the 2021 year. As usual, most of the funding comes from EMC churches. Individuals are the next largest donors, followed by estate fund transfers. We also received a smaller amount of government

funding in 2021, which will not be available in future years.

The Sustainable Funding Strategy committee has completed its work and will be giving a final report to Conference Council in June. Many recommendations have been considered and will be described during the presentation.

Missionary support has been moving steadily towards the 60/40 (undesignated/designated) split for fundraising. Our EMC administered missionaries have been amply supplied thus far, and we hope this trend continues.

EMC Churches have been benefiting from the EMC Church Building Grant Fund. In 2021, nearly \$86,000 was distributed to churches with mortgages. This fund has proven to be an effective way to encourage and support EMC churches in their building programs.

We are grateful to the churches and individuals in the EMC who are invested in the growth of the ministries we are doing together. We want to sow generously so that we will reap a harvest that is worthy of our Lord.
