# National Office Staff Transitions

For many years EMC has been stable in staffing, but that changed in 2021, so a Transition Consultant was engaged to review EMC's needs and make recommendations. Most of the hiring was done in 2022, with start dates in 2023. Pictured at left are the newest EMC staff. Andy Woodworth, Conference Pastor, Mo Friesen, Director Next Generation, a new position. Adrienne Funk, Communications Assistant, Peter Doerksen, quarter-time Western Ambassador, a new position, Emery Plett, Executive Director and George Dumitrascu, Director of Global Outreach.

## Recruitment

The staff thematic goal for 2022-2023 is to "strengthen our approach to the recruitment, training, placement and retention of missionaries, church planters and pastors." To reach that goal we are improving descriptions of the ministries in our fields and the definitions of positions that need to be filled. We've enhanced the Shoulder Tapping section in The Messenger. Better methods for maintaining connections with potential recruits have been developed and a Ministry Questionnaire on our website encourages prospective

workers to consider how they might serve. We're also planning events to encourage youth to consider full-time ministry; with one at Abundant Springs. Lastly, we've engaged a consultant to advise, assist and report on recruitment strategies. Later this year, the focus will shift to training and retention.

# REACH LOOKING BACK

#### Canada

The Evangelical Mennonite Conference started with 4 churches in Manitoba in 1874. In the last 148 years, we have grown to the current **64 churches** and church plants, with another 37 that have since closed or are no longer EMC.

## Nicaragua

EMC has a rich history of reaching out in obedience to the Great Commission. Back in 1966, after a delegation returned from scouting the land, EMC sent our first missionaries, Fred and Doris Friesen, to Nicaragua.

Over the next 25-years, a total of **19 missionaries** were sent to reach the people with the Good News, planting churches and doing discipleship and leadership development. Approximately 25 churches were planted during those 25-years.

In 1991 our last missionaries left the country. In the succeeding 30 years or so, the Fraternity has passionately continued on, with an aim to plant one new church each year, resulting in another 25 churches, with a total now of **52 churches and outreaches** with approximately **500 members**.

The Fraternity takes seriously their desire to have each church represented at their Annual General Meetings, typically held in January each year. Not only do pastors and delegates travel to the meeting, held at Camp Maranatha, with some of them needing two days to get there by horse or burro, buses, and a select few by cars, but they require each church to have five delegates present during a rollcall in the morning, and then confirm their presence in the afternoon when voting takes place.

#### **Paraguay**

EMC missionaries started working in Paraguay in 1959, and **98 missionaries** served from 1959 to 2010. Today the Confraternidad Evangelica Menonita del Paraguay (CEMP) has around **13 churches** with **250 members** and a handful of other churches can trace their roots back to EMC mission work.

#### Mexico

EMC missionaries started working in Mexico in 1957, and **99 missionaries** served from 1957 to 2011. Today there are two conferences (CME and CEMM) with a total of **18 churches** with **1,400 members**.






Today EMC has 110 workers serving around the world.


## EMC MISSIONS TODAY

## Algeciras, Spain

They have been building relationships with many of these migrants, and they have enhanced their language skills by spending two months in Agadir, Morocco. A great connection has been made with a local church that also desires to reach these Moroccan migrants. The long-term goal is to see groups of Jesus followers emerge from this community, not only in Algeciras, but throughout Spain and Europe. A secondary goal is to develop a discipleship training program for young people with interest in ministry.

## Guadalajara, Mexico

It has been nearly a decade since EMC Missions began ministry in Guadalajara, Mexico. Growing the church has been slow and methodical, but progress continues. The goal is to see discipleship groups formed among the middle class in this large

church plant in the capable hands of Angel and Blanca Infantes and national leaders. But the task is big and EMC Missions is eager to send more workers to assist in this important task.

### Santa Cruz, Bolivia

EMC Missions partners with EMMC and other denominations in serving the Low German Mennonite people of the department of Santa Cruz in Bolivia. One exciting development is the increasing involvement of Mennonite churches from Mexico and Paraguay. A few years ago, Ester Fehr lost her husband Benny to COVID. Last year, she married Bill Kehler, a fellow MEM worker who had also been

## **East Paraguay**

Aside from Northern Mexico, Paraguay is the place where EMC has served the longest. Initially, the EMC ministry was restricted to a region known as the Chaco, where many Mennonite groups were located. Years later, the effort shifted to East Paraguay, where ministry to indigenous Paraguayans also became the focus of attention. Chris and Revita Kroeker continue to counsel church members with the "Caring for the Heart" ministry, which

is targeted at strengthening marriages. Travis and Rosey Zacharias are sharing the love of Jesus in a very poor region in eastern Paraguay. We would love to send more workers to assist them.

## CANADIAN CHURCH PLANTING

Our reach continues to expand to other cultures here in Canada. As immigrants come, Ethiopians are among those who are becoming our neighbours. Very often the husbands of these families come first, later bringing his wife and children. As they settle in, the heartstrings of their homeland draw them together where restaurants serving familiar food are established, job opportunities are shared with each other, and gatherings becomes a priority.

That's where our outreach comes into the picture. It's hard to know how many who come are believers, but for some who are, they believe God has called them to Canada to evangelize our nation, no matter what colour our skin. Currently EMC has partnered with two Amharic-speaking church plants, Ephrata Evangelical Church in Edmonton, and Glory of Christ Church in Toronto. Other cities in Canada also have growing numbers, including Winnipeg, where an estimated 15,000 Ethiopians are living. EMC would like to expand our reach to immigrants, both to support, and learn from these vibrant cultures.

## Highlights of other church plants

**Kingdom Life Church** – Pastored by Ibrahim and Phebe Zabaneh, this Arabic-speaking church meets at St. Vital EMC in Winnipeg on Sunday afternoons. They disciple believers and reach out to newcomers.

The Forge Church – Established in St. Thomas, Ontario just before the pandemic, this church, pastored by Bill and Beth Janzen, welcomes people who have wrestled with their faith and long to have a personal relationship with Jesus.

**Gospel Light Fellowship** – Pastored by Abe and Kara Penner, this church in Redcliff, Alberta is seeking creative ways to reach their changing community for Christ.

**Bow Island EMC** – Abe and Anna Bueckert are giving initial leadership to this 2-year-old church plant 45-minutes west of Medicine Hat, Alberta. The group is growing rapidly and hopes to install a full-time pastor soon. **Many Rooms Church Community** – This inner-city church in Winnipeg meets in several homes, under the leadership of Jen Kornelsen, Stephanie Unger, and Dave Guenther.

**Ste. Agathe Outreach** – Scott and Debbie Dick are thankful to see a few more families respond to their ministry, which includes bible studies, youth ministry, and a Kids Zone program.

**Winnipeg Logos Church** – Enduring a season of decline through COVID, this church is seeking the Lord's direction as to what the future holds for them.

- The ability to mobilize the congregation towards effective ministry.



## In summary: from uncertainty to anticipation and gratitude

A new paradigm of ministry: Commissioning-Credentialling-Ordination was the new paradigm developed for the calling, training and recognizing leadership in church, mission and conference contexts. Not only has this brought clarity and unity to our sense of developing leadership, but the rudiments course was also developed for those in the process. New international ministries and church plants illustrated well our commitment to reach others with the love of Christ.

May this creativity in our work together produce abundantly like the fruitful soil in Jesus' parable.
